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### What is the most dangerous word in the Bible?

Our newsletter devotion this month asks a critically important question: What is the most dangerous word in the Bible?

Preparing this lesson has not been easy: 66 separate books, 1,189 different chapters and almost 400,000 words to choose from, including Mephibosheth, Melchizedek, Ahithopel the Gilonite and hundreds of other words which I could neither spell nor pronounce. Where do we even start? I invite you, my reader, to take this challenge. For just a moment, right where you are, what word would you pick if you were asked to choose the most dangerous word in the Bible?

For me, the first word that popped into my head was the word "sin." Without a doubt, "sin" runs rampant throughout the Old and New Testaments, usually with well earned dire consequences attached. "sin" is confessed, denied, hidden behind a fig leaf, lied about and preached against from Genesis to revelation. So "sin" must be the most dangerous word, right?

But the more I thought about it, maybe "sin" would not be my choice. Why? Because there is an antidote, a cure, if you will. In fact, that is the Gospel story. Consider this verse from 1 John:

"If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." 1 John 1:9.

Hallelujah? There is a fail-safe remedy for sin, backed by the promise of God. So, I have decided to take "sin" off the board.

What about "hell" or "death"? I mean "hell" is well...hell. Eternal separation from God. Very, very scary. Beyond dangerous. This must be the correct answer to Double Jeopardy, for sure. But wait, what about this verse from Romans?

"That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus an shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved." Romans 10:9

Simply put, if we believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, hell has no hold on you, or on me. This is a promise of salvation, complete with everlasting life? So, cross "hell" off the list.

What about "death"? Wait, we just covered that. And further:

"For He must reign, till He hath put all enemies under His feet. The last enemy that shall be destroyed is death." 1 Corinthians 15:25-26 Continued on page 2

So, "death," you are also out.

Where does that leave us? Well, after searching the Bible cover to cover, I think I have the answer. <u>SPOILER ALERT</u>. This is only my opinion. You are entitled to your own opinion.

THE MOST DANGEROUS WORD IN THE BIBLE IS THE WORD 'AS'. Just two letters. It is an adverb. It modifies a verb. It means 'to the same extent" and "in the same way" how can that be so very dangerous? Before you run me out of town, please let me explain.

Consider for a moment Jesus' Sermon on the Mount as re-told by Matthew in his Gospel. Specifically, Chapter 6. Every person reading this devotion will immediately recognize this passage-guaranteed.

"Our Father which art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts..."

Matthew 6:9-12

I told you that you would recognize it. The Lord's Prayer! Certainly, one of the-all-time most beloved passages of Scripture, perhaps learned and memorized at your dear Mother's knee. Nothing more precious! But I digress. Let's get back to our theme. How can we relate that most dangerous word -- "as"-- to this iconic prayer?

Here's how. First, do you remember that "as" means "to the same extent" and "in the same way?" Second, did you notice above that I stopped short of finishing verse 12 intentionally? Third, our most dangerous word "as" modifies the verb *forgive*. So, now all me to finish verse 12, with some amplification.

Forgive us our debts as (to the same extent and in the same way) that we forgive our

debtors." (emphasis supplied)

WOW! Do you see what we are praying for? We are asking God to forgive us, but only to the same extent that we have forgiven others who have wronged us. Just suppose, hypothetically of course, that there is someone in my past who has hurt me really bad, maybe years ago. Maybe that someone lied abut me, or gave me their word but then broke it, or accused me of something I absolutely did not do. And just suppose, hypothetically of course, that I am still holding a grudge, never having forgiven them. Do you see what that does to my prayer? It turns my prayer on its ear: "Lord, please forgive me today, but only to the extent that I have forgiven my reprobate, exbrother-in-law, hypothetically of course, who did yada, yada, yada to me back in 1997." yes, the word "as" is a most dangerous word for me. And for you too, if you have an ex-brother-in-law, hypothetically of course.

Let's close in prayer: Lord help me to remember the name or names of people in my life who I have never completely forgiven. And then give me the grace and strength to forgive them today.

Fall seems to have finally arrived and I for one am very grateful! But that means changes. As you know, I have been struggling with my back since March, arriving at the need to sell my home because I am no longer be able to do the work to keep it up. I am hopeful to move into the apartment above the ministry for the time being. It is going to require work to bring it up to habitable standards before that can happen. At least

there I will have no need to do physical labor! We started some of the work upstairs with an east wall that was not sealed or insulated, very porous to the heat. So porous that we could not run A/C there, it would be a waste of money. We did it for classes, but then shut it off when not in use. Proudly, I can say that Joey and Jose from the 2nd Chance Ministry, both graduates, did the work of completely remaking that wall. The difference was startling! They will start the same on the ceiling next. It is in the same condition. Joey Engle is planning to open his own contracting business as soon as he gets his license which he is working on.



All that aside, we received word this week that the state of Texas prison system has gone all digital. We have applied for "approved status" for our lessons to continue to go directly to the inmates. Please pray that we are approved soon as we currently have 277 students in Texas, a few of those in the Federal Prison system. Our office has been scrambling and I must give our ladies lots of credit as we stay on top of so many changes these days. We have held our Texas mail this week waiting for an answer from the state office. Please pray that we hear positively soon. With our relationship with Chaplain Ray and International Prison Ministry in Texas, we have always had a lot of students and we want to keep those, even grow those we now have. Please pray that the Lord will give our nation the will to fight this fentanyl epidemic and give men and women a chance to know God.
